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

### So, Just What Do We Do In Nord Stern??!

A brief synopsis of activities and events offered by your club, Nord Stern, and/or PCA or, just enough info to pique your interest??!!

**Autocross:** A low-speed driving event, teaching one how to maneuver one's car around a set course of pylons on a closed circuit. Instruction is available, drivers compete against the clock. No modifications to one's car are necessary. Some safety equipment needed (helmet).

*ClubTalk:* E-mail listserv for member (Nord Stern) subscribers focusing on car issues and discussions as well as a place to ask questions, get recommendations and comments. Also for last minute breaking news on upcoming events and activities. Subscribe at http://listserv.nordstern.org/mailman/listinfo/clubtalk, or any account edits, updates.

**Concours:** A setting where Porsches are displayed for general viewing and/or inspection competition. Experienced judges evaluate the various models based upon cleanliness, overall condition and authenticity. Note: Nord Stern conducts an 'All Porsche Show' at which cars are 'shown' but not judged.

*Driver Training:* A driving course designed to teach and enhance high speed driving skill and technique on an actual race course. Training includes classroom sessions, on-track 'exercises' plus supervised lapping sessions. A Pre-Requisite for Driver Ed participation and NOT to be confused with Driver Education events. Driver Training includes both Novice and Intermediate level options. Check with DT Chair for additional options.

**Driver Education:** High speed driving event on a closed-course racetrack (Brainerd, Blackhawk Farms, Road America, for example) where drivers are grouped according to prior lap times. Prior Driver Training participation is required. Performance enhancements are frequently made (but not required!).

**Parade Laps:** Sometimes held during lunch at Driver Training/Driver Ed events at closed-course racetracks, this controlled environment with a pace car provides participants an opportunity to take street cars on the track at highway speeds so that they can see what the course is like. Minors are permitted in state approved restraints and with a signed parental release.

**PCA Club Racing:** Wheel-to-wheel competition between drivers who hold PCA club racing licenses. There is a race class for every model Porsche. Safety modifications to your vehicle required.

*Rally:* An event wherein a driver and co-driver complete a predetermined route along open roads following a specific set of navigational instructions. Can be a TDS (time-distance-speed) or a 'fun' rally.

*Social:* Organized gatherings of club members, affiliates and family member to meet, eat and drink beverages!

*Tech Session:* Casual educational session that span a wide range of topics, from general maintenance, through Concours prep, performance enhancements and general car/mechanical knowledge!

Nord Stern monthly business meetings normally cease from June through August but this year we will continue with them through the summer, as needed, to keep up with the Covid-19 developments and

adjust our schedule accordingly. Our April meeting was virtual using video conference technology and we anticipate that format continuing for at least the next few meetings.

In the mean time, our members are itching to drive their P cars and socialize. I understand. It may be a few weeks yet but we will return to our event schedule eventually, perhaps with some modifications for a period of time. The safety of our members is our top priority and we want to be a good citizen complying with state and federal directives.

As a side note, auto repair shops, including the service department at car dealers, are considered "essential businesses" and are allowed to remain open under the current state restrictions. Our local Porsche dealers and most of the independent shops many of us use are open with accommodations for personal distancing. If you have a maintenance/repair issue or upgrade you've been thinking about for your car, now might be a good time to get it taken care of. They can use the business.

We will get through this crisis like we have all prior ones. Have patience. The good news is that, once we are free to congregate in groups again, we have several events planned for the balance of the year.

Be safe and be thankful.



One Stop "Shopping'

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
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ack in 1999 I left behind a job to dive headfirst into dotcom. You can probably guess the end of that story. Every week I usually get out of the house by going to the gym early, then at some point maybe running a few errands, but with the CV-19 thing, not so much. Like a lot of us I've been cooped up in the house for days, now weeks on end and, no surprise, I've gotten stir crazy. The weather hasn't helped. We've had more than a week of very steady, sometimes heavy rain. Every day, same forecast: Yep, more rain. Great! But last week I saw a break in the rain. Exactly one day, a Saturday no less. Sunday more rain. But Saturday, chilly and dry. In other words, perfect.

My plan was to head out mid-morning and take my usual run up to a secret bridge over the Red River, the wet border between Texas and Oklahoma. But the more I thought about it, the more I thought – hey, I bet other people have been cooped up, dealing with self-isolation, social distancing and might need to stretch their legs so to speak and do some driving. As a group our PCA region is very socially active every weekend, (sometimes two or three activities on the same day), mid-week pop-ups and a variety of other regularly scheduled events. I figured others needed to get out of the house and run for a bit.

I posted my idea up on our FB page and was not surprised when many people said, "Hell Yeah." I said

breathe right up to red line.

As we piled on the miles, I could feel it. There is a perceptible change and it sweeps over you. The car helps. Man and machine, the sympathetic beating of human and mechanical hearts. The road makes you focus, pay closer attention to the details. It can transport you if you let it, leaving our trials and concerns behind, if for only a couple of hours. We turned onto a road that leads across the river, the border between two states. There is a sight line of almost two miles down a hill before the bridge. I saw clear road ahead. May have gone just slightly above the speed limit, just a smidge. In the distance I can start to make out a red car shape on the left side of the bridge and I can also see some tiny stick figures near the car. I must admit, I lifted. Then I realized it was Porsche people waiting to cheer us on, so I

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
punched it again, giving them a show. We roared past them in a blurred whoosh of sound, color and speed.

A brief stop to meet and greet the Porsche people and then we were back at it, a little

more relaxed on the return. Cars peeled off as they needed gas or headed home in other directions. The final two cars, my 981 Cayman S and a 951 drove the last few miles together before we finally parted ways. I don't know about you, but I needed that. It helped me reconnect to — me. And every once in a while, that blast in the country is just what the doctor ordered. Pulling into the garage, I turned the key and the great beast of an engine stilled. I let out a long slow breath too. I feel good after a drive like that. Just the right amount of edge, adrenaline and seat time.

We may be alone in our cars, but in this case, we are together at the same time, practicing a good measure of medically mandated social distancing – at maybe just a few miles over the posted speed limit.

### Driver Ed and Driver Training SAFETY Updates and Information for all Nord Stern members participating in track activities

Hello Drivers,

Track season is almost upon us so here is a reminder to get your safety gear in order before it's time to head to the track. Our first Driver Training (now cancelled) but Driver Education for the 2020 season is April 25-26 which also is now canceled but let's cross our fingers for our other currently calendared track events.

**Helmets:** 2010 and 2015 Snell rated helmets will be accepted this season as 2020 models will not be available until late in the year. Helmets must be presented to the driver check-in desk at each track event.

**Tech Inspection:** Each car must pass an inspection by an approved shop or individual. Tech forms must be presented to the driver check-in desk at the participant's first DE event for the year. 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

24 NORD STERN MAY 2020 his book begins with a rather self-centered forword by Bernie Ecclestone who, for better or worse, was an integral part of Formula One and its championships. The introduction, replete with several driver portraits, provides an overview of the history of Formula One and sets the tone for the stories of effort, perseverance and of course, luck . . . Which follow.

The text is all about the guys – the champions, not the championships nor the cars. The racing careers of all 33 (through the 2019 season) are profiled. Included are many drivers, no where near as famous as the excluded Stirling Moss (who indeed never was a champion, a whole 'nother story), but who achieved at least one World Champion title.

The author of this profusely illustrated book is a prominent, long time British motor-sports writer and broadcaster, apparently no relation to Formula One champion Lewis Hamilton or once famous sports-car racer Duncan Hamilton. Though well-written and very readable (including quotes from the champions themselves), the point of this book is the outstanding photographs by Bernard Cahier, familiar to old time Road & Track readers, and his son Raoul-Henri. The pictures (with comprehensive captions) give an up close and personal look at the drivers and their environment. Included is an interesting shot of a handsome Niki Lauda, a face forgotten by some; never known by many.

These captivating stories are not just about on-track performances, but about backgrounds, personalities and character. Definitely not a book of dry racing statistics, it provides insight into the champions as people, not just as racers. Though there are some descriptions of extraordinary daring-do on the track, it is basically about the drivers themselves, their backgrounds, character and interactions. One need not be a racing enthusiast to appreciate the interesting biographies in this book, or the intellectually elevating effect of the polysyllabic British vocabulary used.

Presented in chronological order of their first championship, the story of Lewis Hamilton, current reigning champion, is somewhat awkwardly not the last chapter in the book.

There is barely mentioned Porsche content because both Niki Lauda and Alain Prost drove Porsche powered McLarens in the mid '80s.

FORMULA ONE is coffee table sized, but without the dust jacket it is just a plain red book. The end papers present a checkerboard of faces. - some are familiar, but you have to read the book to be able to identify all of them. A must have for anyone interested in the stories of Formula One drivers, their professional lives and racing careers. Perhaps to become out dated by the crowning of future champions, this book will forever be a classic. The first printing might even become a collector book.

Hardcover with 240 9-1/2 x 12 inch pages, it is printed on heavy, semi-gloss paper to enhance the crispness of the photographs. Pictures are all black and white until color shots of Jackie Stewart appear in '69 and '71. There is a limited index. By the time you read this, it should be available for \$45.00 from your favorite book seller (ask for it), or from QuartoKnows.com.

### **ANSWERS:**

#### 1.1948

Although Porsche has designed and created products and technologies for more than 100 years the first car was officially approved on the 8th of June 1948. This was the first 356 to see the light of day. The Porsche got the license plate "K-45286".

#### 2. Kärnten, Austria

On 8 June 1948 the first Porsche 356 was officially approved by the state government of Kärnten in Austria. Because of the Second World War, Porsche had moved from Stuttgart-Zuffenhausen to Gmünd in Kärnten.

#### 3. False

Ferdinand Porsche, the designer of the Volkswagen Beetle died in 1951. His son, named Ferdinand "Ferry" Porsche, had already taken over the role of designer for Porsche at that moment. So both the Volkswagen Beetle and the Porsche 356 are designed by Ferdinand Porsche, but it wasn't the same man.

### 4. 35 Bhp

The first Porsche 356 had a modified 1.1-litre VW engine developing 35 bhp at 4000 rpm. It gave the car a top speed of 135 km/h or 84 mph.

### 5. 550 Synder

James Dean crashed his car on 30 September, 1955. The car nicknamed "The Little Bastard" was a 550 Spyder. After the crash the car was bought and taken apart to be just in race cars. Two race car drivers had accidents during a race in October 1956. Troy McHenry died, racing a car with the engine of "The Little Bastard" went out of control and hit a tree. William Eschrid's flipped over. He survived despite serious injuries.

### 6.901

In 1963 the first 911 was made. Porsche wanted to call this model series 901, but the French car manufacturer Peugeot already had the rights for this name.

### 7.500

The first Porsche 911 Turbo was presented at the 1974 Paris Motor Show and originally intended for a production "volume" of just 500 units. By the time the last air-cooled 911 was delivered to its proud owner on 31 March 1998, however, Porsche had built and sold no less then 32,335 Turbos to customers the world over.

#### 8.928

The "car of the year" award exists since 1964 and is a prize given out by the car journalists. Up to 2005 Porsche has the only sports car to win this award. The Porsche 928 won in 1978 defeating the BMW series 7 and the Ford Granada. The 928 was the model that had to replace the decaying 911, and had a water cooled front engine. The fine looking 928 would eventually fail in the role of succeeding a myth.

### 9. Moby Dick

The car was named after a book by Herman Melville. He also wrote "Battle-Pieces and Aspects of the War". Ducktail was a nickname used for the rear wing that Porsche introduced for their 911 series. Spyder is the name for their 550.

### 10. **924**

In 1976 Audi supplied the engine for the first water-cooled Porsche. The 914, 924 and Cayenne are all developed with the help of Volkswagen.

### 11. Formula 1 World Championship

The Monte Carlo rally was won by Vic Elford and David Stone in 1968 in their 911 Turbo. The first Porsche victory on Le Mans was in 1970 from a Porsche 917K driven by Hans Herrmann and Richard Attwood. In 1984 Porsche won their first title in the Paris-Dakar Rally. A 959 driven by Rene Metge and Dominic Lemoyne. Porsche did win the Formula 1 World Championship, but this was a McLaren car powered by a Porsche engine.

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### Once upon a time . . .

orsches came with a nice set of tools which included a jack, and a lug wrench, and a standard or collapsible spare tire! But those times are long gone. In order to save weight and manufacturing costs, they did away with all of that in 2005.



But this deletion is not an exclusive Porsche move. Most car makers adopted the same policy.

You do get a can of
Fix-a-Flat and an air
compressor, but I wouldn't
recommend using that
slime at all. It makes a
mess and will cost a pretty
penny to clean from the


wheel. My recommendation is to carry a tire plug kit and a 12-volt air compressor (both available at most auto part stores). Also make sure your AAA payments are up to date and don't forget your cell phone in order to call the flat bed if you can't or don't want to fix the inevitable flat tire.

You may be thinking: "But wait, I don't need a flat bed or a tire plugging kit because if Porsche didn't include a spare tire or tools that means that my car came with run-flats, right?" Well, you would be wrong if you assumed that.



You can install aftermarket run-flats although they are very limited in sizes and widths and are also more expensive.


If you purchased your car used and you wonder whether it has runflats, you can check the tires themselves. They would have one of the RFT (Run Flat Tire) symbols on the sidewall.



So, should you install run-flats as your next set of tires? First, a little more info on RFTs.

There are two basic classifications: **Self Supporting Tire** and **Support Ring System.** 

**Self Supporting Tires** have reinforced sidewall construction that continues to support the vehicle even with total loss of pressure. This allows for continued operation up to the speed and distance specified by the manufacturer.



**Support Ring Tires** employ a ring of hard rubber or other structure that can support the vehicle's weight in a complete air loss condition.

If you can find them your car's size and you're OK with the extra cost you may still want to consider the following:

RFTs should only be installed on cars equipped with TPMS (tire pressure monitoring system) because if you get a puncture and loose air pressure on a RFT you may not know it due to the extra stiffness of the sidewalls. RFTs don't flatten down when they lose air pressure, they look and drive pretty normal, but RFTs can only be run 50 - 100 miles at a max speed of 55 mph once they lose air. Then they MUST be replaced. They cannot be repaired and/or re-inflated.

In my opinion, the only real advantage of RFTs is that when you get a puncture, you don't have to pull over immediately to change or fix the flat, which is good if you're on a heavy-traffic road or dangerous otherwise, and in racing, where having to pull into the pits for a flat could cost you the race, especially if it happens on the closing laps and you have the lead. Many track tires are now available as RFTs.

More tire manufacturers a expanding their RFTs so you may be able to find a set that fits your car. Some sport cars, such as Chevrolet's Corvette now come wit RFTs standard. Maybe Porsche will follow suit.
