So, Just What Do We Do In Nord Stern??! A brief synopsis of activities and events offered by your club, Nord Stern, and/or PCA or, just enough info to pique your interest??!!

**AUTOCROSS:** A low-speed driving event teaches a person how to maneuver one's car through a course marked by pylons on a closed circuit. Instruction is often available, and drivers compete against the clock. No modifications to one's car are necessary. Helmet required.

**CLUBTALK:** This is an email-based list server for member subscribers focusing on car issues and discussions and a place to ask questions, get recommendations and comments. Alsolast minute breaking news on upcoming events and activities. Join Clubtalk at this link.

**CAR SHOWS/CONCOURS:** Members enjoy gathering and looking over a wide range of Porsche models, most nicely detailed to show them at their best. A generally informal and social setting.

- All Porsche Show: Nord Stern annually hosts the All Porsche Show in late June. One of the biggest events of the year, often with 150+ cars in attendance. A non-judged, "shine and show" event that attracts members and their families, along with prospective members.
- Concours: A setting where Porsches are displayed for general viewing and/or inspection, with
  competition in many distinct model categories. Experienced judges evaluate the various models
  based on cleanliness, overall condition, and authenticity.

**DRIVES:** An organized drive over a planned scenic route, usually to a meeting spot that offers food, beverages, and space to socialize. Venues rotate among popular destinations that offer good amenities for Porsche enthusiasts.

**DRIVER TRAINING (DT):** A driver training course designed to teach and enhance high-speed driving skills and techniques on an actual race course. Training includes classroom sessions, on-track exercises, and supervised lapping sessions. Completion of "DT" is a Pre-Requisite for "DE" participation and is NOT to be confused with Driver Education events. Driver Training includes both Novice and Intermediate level options. A current Snell-rated helmet is required at a minimum.

**DRIVER EDUCATION (DE):** A high-speed driving event on a closed-course racetrack (Brainerd and Road America for example) where drivers are grouped according to prior experience and car capabilities. Lapping sessions allows our members to enjoy the full performance capabilities of their cars in a relatively safe, controlled environment. Instructors are generally available for novices. Prior Driver Training participation is required. A current Snell-rated helmet is required at a minimum.

**PARADE LAPS:** Typically held during lunch sessions at DT/DE/Club Racing events at closed-course racetracks, this controlled environment with a pace car provides participants an opportunity to take street cars on the track at highway speeds so that they can see what the course is like. Minors are permitted in state approved restraints and with a signed parental release.

**PCA CLUB RACING:** Wheel-to-wheel competition between drivers who hold PCA club racing licenses. There is a race class for every model Porsche. Safety modifications to your vehicle required. This national program is administrated and overseen by a volunteer, trained national staff. The PCA website has a full schedule of races and information. Prior race experience required and/or specific amount of Driver Education participation. Talk to our Chief Driving Instructor for further information.

**RALLY:** An event wherein a driver and co-driver complete a predetermined route along open roads following a specific set of navigational instructions. Can be a TDS (time-distance-speed) or a 'fun' rally. Social: Organized gatherings of club members, affiliates and family member to meet, eat, and socialize. Many different venues and activities are selected every year to bring members together.

**TECH SESSIONS:** Casual educational session spaning a wide range of topics from general maintenance, through Concours prep, performance enhancements , and general car/mechanical knowledge!

**VOLUNTEERING:** The club runs on volunteers! A great way to meet fellow members and get the most out of your membership. We exist because of members volunteering their time and talents to plan and execute our many events. With no paid staff, we depend entirely on volunteers to run our club and keep a calendar of interesting, well-planned activities. Whether its track events, social activities, tech, touring, tech sessions, car shows, or others, we have a place for you and many an opportunity to get involved.

#### PCA HPDE MINIMUM STANDARDS UPDATE

Good news, PCA has come to its senses and changed some key safety standards for the 2025 season. Many thanks to Nord Stern DE safety co-chair, Paul Thai for his advocacy.

#### 2015 SNELL HELMET EXPIRATION

There is a delay in 2025 Snell certification standards and therefore manufacturer production.

- 2015/2020 Snell rated helmets will be accepted for all of 2025.
- Snell 2015 helmet expiration has been delayed until 2/28/26.
- Snell 2025 helmets won't be on the market until 10/1/25.

#### TECH INSPECTIONS

- All tech inspections will now be valid for 120 days.
- A region may choose a shorter timeframe but not longer.
- Nord Stern will follow the 120 day guidance.
- If an incident or mechanical occurs during the 120 days a new tech inspection is required.
- The driver is required to keep the tech inspection for the full 120 days.
- The new form will be on Nordstern.org soon.

#### WINDOWS AND PASSING SIGNALS

Per the new minimum standards we may now run with side windows up OR down and use hand signals OR turn signals for passing contracts (point bys). This is a big win for safety and common sense:

- Some cars don't have windows and some windows don't go down.
- Windows up keeps arms in the car.
- Sometimes it's too hot to run with windows down.
- Sometimes it's raining.
- Windows are engineered to be part of vehicle crash integrity.
- All track safety rigs have hammers.

That's all for now. Stay tuned for more updates on our track dates and registration. Clear your calendar and encourage your friends to join you. That includes BMW and Audi enthusiasts.








ecember 27, 2024: A 911 like never before: 25 years ago, Porsche celebrated the world premiere of the first GT3. The puristic sports car continues to delight


Porsche enthusiasts to this day – including a prominent first owner.



A reunion after almost a quarter of a century. Walter Röhrl is overwhelmed. "For me, this is like a journey back in time," says the twotime rally world champion and Porsche brand ambassador. In front of him is a flawless 911 GT3 (996) in the Clubsport version. It is the first 911 GT3 in the company's history,

prominent driver: S-WR 996.

#### FITS LIKE A GLOVE

Röhrl sits down in the bucket seat covered with heat and flame-resistant Nomex. Even at 77, the 1.96 meter tall man skillfully weaves his way past the roll cage. The seat: fits like a glove. The steering wheel: "It's unbelievable how steeply it's positioned," Röhrl says. His expert eye wanders over the five characteristic round instruments. "Fantastic," he exclaims. "The first GT3 was the sportiest Porsche for the road at the time. As honest and purist as it could be." A mischievous smile follows. "Shall we take a spin?"

Let's do it right away. But first, let's linger for a moment at this special meeting place. We are guests in a lovingly designed coach house near the Swabian town of Flacht, also known among fans as the home of the Porsche Motorsport Center. FL8WERK (pronounced "Flachtwerk") is the name of the circle of friends of Porsche enthusiasts who run this private retreat with great passion. Old neon signs, advertising posters, pinball machines, a pool table, lots of cozy seating areas - this is where the Porsche soul finds a home. "Every piece tells a story," explains Timo Conrad, co-founder of FL8WERK and current owner of Walter Röhrl's former company sports car in arctic silver metallic. He carefully leads us past display cases with books and automobilia of all kinds, Porsche model cars of all common scales and countless souvenir photos. And almost every piece also tells of the great love for a brand.

"We have been organizing tours together for around ten years, we enjoy talking shop and tinkering, and we also look into the history of our special vehicles," says Conrad. All of this is "purely a hobby," as the entrepreneur explains. "Most of us work in completely different fields."

The hosts had no fewer than seven firstgeneration GT3 models in the rare Clubsport version and in rare colors such as Nogaro Blue, Lapis Blue and Jungle Green Metallic on display that day. "It is estimated that only around 20 percent of the almost 1,900 examples of the first version of the 996 were built in this version specially designed for racing," explains Alex Schwaderer, also a co-founder of FL8WERK. They can be recognized by the lack of side airbags, a battery master switch on the center tunnel, the aforementioned Nomex bucket seats and the permanently installed roll cage. Six-point seat belts and a fire extinguisher were supplied ex works. Another feature is not visible from the outside: the singlemass flywheel instead of the normal

dual-mass flywheel between the engine and transmission. "It ensures that the engine responds more quickly when accelerating," says Schwaderer. With a smile, he adds: "And for the characteristic rattling when idling."

"It's the direct, unadulterated driving experience that we love so much about the first 911 GT3," enthuses Cleto Di Paolo, also one of the founders of FL8WERK. "The car is slim and light, the engine characteristics are perfectly suited to the intended use, the balance is well-balanced, and there is direct feedback on every steering wheel movement." Without today's assistance systems, Di Paolo adds, it all comes down to "driving skills". "But that's exactly what we like." When it comes to pushing the limits on the racetrack, the FL8WERK friends are in their element - just like the GT3 Clubsport. "You can feel the racing experience that is in the car," explains Timo Conrad, "and at the same time it can be driven easily in everyday life. Only

Porsche can pull off this balancing act."

#### FOR SPORT-ORIENTED CUSTOMERS

While the Zuffenhausen-based company set new standards for comfort, safety and efficiency in sports cars from 1997 with the fifth, water-cooled generation of the 911 Carrera (996), the GT3 was deliberately aimed at extremely sporty customers. The model name is borrowed from the GT3 racing class in which the corresponding motorsport versions are used. "At Porsche, I worked mainly with Roland Kussmaul," recalls Walter Röhrl, who was himself involved in the development of the GT3. "His vision and that of the other responsible engineers was clear: they wanted to create a racing car with road approval." This concept of the decidedly sporty 911 variants established a successful tradition at Porsche and has lost none of its appeal to this day. The GT models have been the sporty avantgarde of every 911 generation since then.

In 1999, the GT3 was distinguished from the more civilian 996 versions by a significant increase in power by 44 kW (60 hp) to 265 kW (360 hp), targeted fine-tuning of the chassis and bodywork, and the weightrelated omission of some comfort features. The water-cooled naturally aspirated engine is still a characteristic feature of all GT3 generations, as is the expansive, initially fixed rear wing. "Every millimeter is designed for maximum performance," Porsche once advertised in a brochure for its sportiest 911 version. "With the GT3, form follows function. And function is followed by driving pleasure. A driving

as Conrad now calls it. "I bought it from a private individual in southern Germany and initially had no idea about its history." Only the entry of the first owner in the vehicle registration document gave a clue: Dr. Ing.

experience that comes directly from racing." Timo Conrad from FL8WERK also feels connected to racing. "First I drove karts, then various formula classes, even hill climbs," he says, "but at some point I had to honestly ask myself whether a career as a racing driver was feasible." He then decided to pursue a career in his parents' company.


His preference for a sporty form of transport remained, and it is therefore not surprising that Conrad was enthusiastic about the hc F. Porsche AG. "It was a factory car, that was clear," says Conrad, "but it was only gradually that I was able to uncover the find like an archaeologist." Certain components indicated that it was a so-called pre-production example, which was later confirmed by research. One thing led to another.



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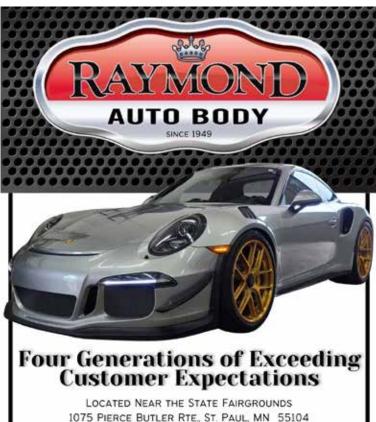

996 - which, to celebrate today, is once again emblazoned above the bumper as a replica. "At an event I asked Walter Röhrl directly whether it could have been his car." He could still remember it very well. Conrad: "An incredible stroke of luck."

And so Walter Röhrl immediately feels at home again on his first drive in more than two decades when he sits behind the wheel of the GT3 Clubsport. One turn of the ignition key - there it is again, the typical rattling of the single-mass flywheel. Röhrl laughs: "Anyone who doesn't know that thinks the engine is broken." The former rally champion starts telling the story: "With a GT3 of the 996 generation, we set a record on the Nordschleife of the Nürburgring: 7:56 minutes!" The first time that the eightminute mark was beaten with a street-legal 911. "The car was a sensation back then," Röhrl concludes, "and nothing has changed to this day."

## Legendary Porsche Race Cars

Endurance racing stands for fighting and nail-biting, tears, cheers, and sweat. That's what makes the drivers heroes. But it's not just the people who become legends. Cars do, too.

#### 935/77

The Porsche 935 was a 911 racing version that brought home another World Sportscar Championship in 1976, after a five-year hiatus.

With the end of the prototype racing era, 1976 saw the advent of the great age of production race cars in Group 5. With the 935, Porsche presented a nearly 600 hp (441 kW) version of the 911, which brought a World Sportscar Championship back to Zuffenhausen after a five-year hiatus. Together with the 936, it took the World Championship title in 1976 and, thanks to numerous customer teams, dominated the races of Group 5 until 1981. Successful drivers of the Porsche 935 included Jacky Ickx, Jochen Mass, Klaus Ludwig, Rolf Stommelen, Manfred Winkelhock, and Bob Wollek. Technically, the 935 was based on the 911 Turbo, but visually it was distinguished by its aerodynamic "flat nose" as well as its striking double rear wing. In 1977, the aerodynamics of the 935 were optimized once again. The boxer engine was also outfitted with a second turbocharger, which boosted the power to 630 hp (463 kW). Porsche successfully defended its title, and Rolf Stommelen won the German Racing Championship in the private Loos Porsche 935. In the years that followed, numerous factory and private drivers celebrated wins in the 935.

et's all turn the wayback machine to when Baby Boomers began coming of age, to the early '60s. Ok, from a do-run-run automotive style standpoint, what comes to mind?

I'll take three, please. As the leader of the pack, I wa watusi up to the Jaguar E-Type. From 1961. If only because none other than Enzo Ferrari allegedly called it the most beautiful car ever designed, at least to that point.

Who can argue with Il Commendatore? Even though one could see the derivation from the D-Type racers and their stillborn XK-SS street version. No matter. It was, and probably still is, the ultimate chick magnet. In some circles, that alone puts it at the top of the heap.

Second, I'll take the C2 Corvette, specifically the split-window coupe. Remember, this was 1963, the roads were chock-a-block with mastodons, Sedan de Villes, Imperials, and the like. I remember spying my first C2, out there, in the wild. I almost did a head-over-heels stoppie on my banana-seat Schwinn.

I admit, my memories are swayed by the fact that, a few years later, my uncle bought a '66 coupe, 327 auto, that he let me drive. You remember? With the radio vertically integrated in the center stack? Wound it up, on the Wantagh State Parkway, heading to Jones Beach. Tack it up, tack it up, the windblast drowned out Hey Little Cobra. Could this be magic? It was.

Third, the original 911. I mean, hey, after all these generations, and models, and sub-models, nobody can not tell a 911, any 911, from anything else on the road. Still. To this day. Who else, or what else, can say that? I'm waiting. Repeat after me, the 911 defines "iconic." Kudos, Butzi Porsche.

Which is why it's so disconcerting to me to see what's going on today. Stop at a light, any light, and look around. What do you see? A sea of love? No! A sea of black, or white, or silver SUVs that . . . and, hey, probably like you, I could identify virtually every car on the road at five years old . . . today they all look, ok, I'll say it, the same. I'm embarrassed to admit something. It's this. I've had to peek around the rear, in order to see the nameplate and identify the brand. Me. Probably you too. I'm ashamed.

Even exotics. This actually happened to me recently. I was walking my dog in my neighborhood and I saw a bright "rosso" . . . Ferrari 296? . . . parked at the curb. I got closer and, my jaw dropped. No! It was a "Little Red Corvette!" A C8! What the . . . Had I completely lost my touch? I screamed "heel" and we did a quick three-point turn. Apparently, this commonality, this, ok, I'll say it, copy-cat derivative blandness, hasn't gone without recognition, at least by some automotive design studios. At least two examples I've stumbled on recently come to mind.

The first is the "almost production" Honda 0 Saloon that has been making the car-show circuit. Now, from the side-view, it looks to me like a Lamborghini Espada that slipped into a galaxy far, far away. From the front, the headlights lie flat, above the grill, like, let's pause for reverence, the Miura. Really.


Beneath it all lurks Honda's next-gen EV platform. Which to me is fine, just fine. Reality may bite, but at least it may look good. One thing is for sure, neither you nor I will mistake it for anything else on the road. But, and it's a big but. Would a five-year-old version of myself today stop in my tracks and start hyperventilating? I don't know.

Nor do I know about the recently announced Jaguar rebranding. Like Honda, it's all for its coming EV lineup. The first show-car iteration is called the Type 00. I'm not kidding. A coincidence with Honda? Do I see a raised eyebrow? I don't know, but it's not a good start. Nonetheless, in a story in Business Insider, Jaguar's chief exterior designer, Constantino Segui Gilabert, says "It is a dramatic presence, channeling a unique spirit of British creativity and originality. It celebrates art and embodies the essence of Exuberant Modernism."

Like the SS 100? The XK 120, 140 and 150? The E-Type? Even the F-Type? Is Sir William Lyons rolling over in his grave? Or, is he saluting Jaguar's new direction, from his perch in car design heaven? I don't know. It's hard to tell much, from the photos I've seen so far.

One thing is for sure. The EV ripple, or wave, depending on your point of view, is giving automotive designers a rare opportunity to add their names to the pantheon of Pininfarina, Giugiaro, Gandini, Mitchell, Shinoda, Sacco, Butzi and more . . . even Sir William. Will it work? Can it work today?

Ahh, change always leads us to the same place, doesn't it. We'll have to stay tuned. Because, once again, only time will tell. But I really would like to be five again, to see for myself.
